Retrace The 1745 Uprising

Charles Edward Stuart, whose ill-fated attempt to retake the Crown for the Stewarts tore apart Highland culture and the clan system, is the subject of a major exhibition at the National Museum of Scotland through November 12 (see www.nms.ac.uk/national-museum-of-scotland for details). And now, visitors can also follow in the steps of Bonnie Prince Charlie and his supporters on a new trail of 25 properties and attractions throughout Scotland. The Web site www.jacobitetrail.co.uk features a free downloadable guide that includes a map and information about each historic property on the trail, as well as other information about this turbulent period of history.

The Scottish Crown Princess

Summer brings joy, adventure and new travels; as well as opportunities to explore the influence of Scotland and its people around the globe. This summer Brian and I visited Hawai'i, where we learned about the history of the Hawai'in Crown Princess "Victoria Kawēkiu Ka'iulani Lunalilo Kalaninuiahilapalapa Cleghorn." Please do not ask me to pronounce her name! She is the princess daughter born of a Scotman, Archibald Cleghorn.

The Scottish name "Cleghorn" originates from the county of Lanarkshire, which is now part of the Strathclyde region. The breakdown of the name conceivably came from Ye Old English pre 7th Century word "claeg" meaning "clayey," plus the Old English term "horn," a corner, bend or tongue of land; hence, "land projection or river fork with clayey soil." Historical files note that the surname was first recorded in the early part of the 16th Century. Here are a few of the first recorded Cleghorns:


- David Cleghorne in 1541 was witness to a sasine (Scots law, meaning the delivery of feudal (immovable) property, typically land), during the reign of King James V of Scotland.
- George Cleghorn (1716-1789) born in Granton, Edinburgh, he studied at Edinburgh University and became professor of anatomy in Dublin, 1751
- James Cleghorn (1778-1838), a journalist in Edinburgh, who became an accountant of repute. (All Scottish accountants are of good repute!)

Alas, I digress!

Archibald was born on November 15, 1835 in Edinburgh, Scotland, to Thomas Cleghorn and wife, Janet Nisbet. At the age of 16, in 1851, Archie traveled with his parents to Honolulu, Hawai'i (at that time an independent kingdom), where his father established a dry goods store. His father died within the year, and his mother left for New Zealand, but Archibald remained in Hawai'i and continued running the store. His business prospered and he expanded to other islands.

On September 22, 1870, Cleghorn, married Hawaiian Princess Miriam Likelike, when she was only 19 years old. She was the sister of Prince David Kalākana who became King four years later in 1874. Originally Princess Miriam was betrothed to Albert Kunuiakea, an illegitimate son of King Kamehameha III, but the Princess broke off her engagement to marry Archibald Scott Cleghorn the successful Scotsman who was almost twice her age.

After some time into her marriage, her Scottish husband earned a reputation for being "stormy and demanding," and she simply could not take him anymore! In one of her strongest letters to her husband she wrote:

"You always blame me in everything and I am getting tired of it. I will have to kill myself then you won't have me to growl at all the time. I think we are better separated...as you don't love me and I don't love you so I will simply say, 'God bless the good."

But as the Scottish saying goes "you can't live with 'em, and you can't live without 'em," she returned to his side and five years after being married she gave birth to a daughter, Princess Ka'iulani, who would be the only Kalākaua of her generation, as Princess Miriam Likelike would never conceive another child. (Interesting to note, Princess Ka'iulani was baptized on Christmas Day in 1875 at the

St. Andrews Anglican Cathedral in Hawai'i).

Princess Miriam's life was short lived, and much of it was spent entertaining important people from all over the world and she became known as a kind and generous host. No one knows why she died on February 2nd, 1887 when she was only 36 years old, but it is said that she stopped eating and just went early to bed. There are many folklore Hawai'in tales about a shoal of bright red "Aweoweo" fish seen off the shore at the time of her death. These fish are considered a dangerous and deadly omen in Hawai'in folklore. Others say that she died to appease the anger of Pele, the Volcano goddess. But, interestingly it was her dying prophecy that lives on in Hawai'in folklore the most as she predicted that Ka'iulani, her beautiful Scottish daughter, would never marry and never become Queen. This prophecy later became true.

So, this sad story ends...as our Scottish Princess never made it to Queen, but she became the heir to the throne of the Kingdom of Hawai'i and was known through the Kingdom as the Crown Princess, for her intelligence and determination.






