After recently spending the last 6 weeks in Scotland, I am filled with joy and fabulous memories of incredible scenery. Not just that, but lots of news from Scotland too!

Firstly, I was thrilled to learn that the University of Edinburgh made it into the top 20, on the QS Top University Rankings list for 2022. (<https://www.topuniversities.com/university-rankings/world-university-rankings/2022>). This is a huge accomplishment for the University and its faculty, and given that we are such supporters of college education, this bodes well for our grant program too. Amongst the top 5 were MIT, Oxford, Stanford, Cambridge and Harvard! Overall, the UK is tracking pretty well in its global contributions to education. Edinburgh University came in 16th. Well done Edinburgh University!

the longest day of the year.

As you can see on the previous page, Scotland has three more hours of daylight than we do in the US. I was interested to know what kinds of traditions Scotland has for celebrating the Solstice. The northern most islands of Orkney and Shetland have at least another hour of daylight. The speculation regarding their traditions is that being very close to Scandinavia, those traditions have had a lot of Scandinavian influence.

their positioning. Published in the Journal of Archaeological Reports in 2017, Australian researchers found that the stones are not just connected with the Sun and the Moon but have a complex relationship between the alignment of the stones, the surrounding landscape and horizon, and the movements of the Sun and the Moon across that landscape.

The scientists' findings show that these ancient circles were created based on a calculated understanding of celestial movement and reveal that the ancient builders had a deep understanding of the relationship of the Earth with

Standing Stones of Callanish

On the islands and the mainland, the festival is primarily a Celtic fire festival traditionally celebrated on either the 23rd or 24th of June, although the longest day actually falls on the 21st. Callanais (Scottish Gaelic) or the anglicized form Callanish, which stands on the Isle of Lewis, is a wonderful example of a standing stone circle. The Callanish Stones, as well as the Standing Stones of Stenness on the Isle of Orkney, are both older than Stonehenge by approximately 500 years. Their layout reflects the position of the sun and moon at different phases as well as their relation to the horizon in different geographic locations.

In the past 5 years, researchers from Australia have answered key questions about the stone monuments including the intent behind

the sun and moon. How ever you celebrate the Summer Solstice, remember its connection to the earth and sky, and raise a glass to those ancient and extremely observant builders.



It felt during this time that there was no pandemic at all... with so many celebrations, but sad to say that it looks like things are on the way up for a 3rd wave in Scotland. There have been 254,325 confirmed cases of Covid-19 in Scotland and 7,692 people have died following a positive test for the virus, according to the Scottish government. Glasgow was placed into a higher level of lockdown recently, and the June release for everyone was postponed to July (as in England too). This was incredibly disappointing for the people of Scotland. Weekly cases are now 6 times what they were at the beginning of May and some research is showing that the vaccinations may (or may not) be effective against the Delta variant.

On a brighter note, I watched the Queen's Trooping of the Colours to mark the Queen's 95th birthday, held at Windsor Castle. While the event was enormously scaled back from what it has been in years prior (with thousands of soldiers, hundreds of horses and musicians parading meticulously through London to Buckingham Palace), the event was spectacular just the same. This event has actually been going for over 260 years to celebrate sovereign. This was the Queen's 1st time attending this event without Prince Philip, and instead she was accompanied by her cousin, Prince Edward the Duke of Kent. Queen Elizabeth, freshly back from the Group of Seven Summit in Cornwall was greeted with a playing of the national

Board of Trustees Report

Trustee Affairs / Introduction of Prospective Trustee: Bruce McMillan

Regarding recruiting for the trustee vacancy—I had a good

phone call recently with longtime member, Past President (1998-99), and past board member & Chair Bruce McMillan. Bruce was responsive to our request that he consider the open trustee seat and is eager to serve. We were pleased to have Bruce join us on Sunday evening's trustees' meeting via Zoom—for introductions and discussion of Bruce's coming aboard. Bruce's proposal to the Board was voted upon 4-0 in affirmation (with one non-vote due to absence). If all goes according to

plan, as per our By-Laws, members will be notified in writing at least 10 days prior to the next regularly scheduled member meeting (September 20) of the intention to have Bruce come aboard; and then a vote.

Property Management / Hill & Co / Grace Monares

Property Manager Grace & I have been in touch throughout the month, most recently mid-June—for our monthly check-in call. The good news: Leasing Agent Lisa has located new tenants (Quincy & Dustin) to assume occupancy in early July, including a slight rent increase to \$6,000 per mo. There will be minimal turnover costs associated with the move-in, e.g. the painting of one hallway wall, and carpet cleaning (due to departing tenant's dog/s). Grace also updated us that the heating problem has been resolved and is less expensive (\$2,145) than anticipated. Hill & Co's timing regarding financial reporting was better this month, meeting our timing and timeline needs both with regards to provisional reporting and May's full report received on June 15.

Bookkeeping / Jessica Whelan

By receiving provisional and final reports from Hill & Co., for May in a timelier manner—this greatly eased Jessica's financial reporting task, similarly meeting our timing needs & timeline this month. There has also been notable progress this month with respect to Richard's 14 item list for follow up—which has expanded by a few items, and is in process. Richard and I had a good hourlong phone call with Jessica—she was responsive, appears to understand what we're trying to accomplish, and is willing to work together to meet our needs. Richard has provided additional guidance for Jessica (and our team more generally) in the form of two documents: SASSF Accounting Policies, and SASSF Depreciation Recommendations. We anticipate a follow up call with Jessica in the next couple of weeks, and still more good progress over the next month. We expect the outstanding accounting revisions & corrections to be reconciled over the Summer, well in advance of resuming in September; so that we'll be able to pick up with an annual financial audit, and fulfilling our tax obligations at that time.

May–June 2021 Financials

Our Wells Fargo checking account dipped below \$10K early last week—which is the lower bound of the checking account reserve we like to maintain. That in addition to the Whisky Wednesday's \$5,828 invoice (for five months) which arrived on June 11, and was paid almost as quickly, had our checking balance down to ~\$2,500. Also, with one scholarship request for payment of almost \$3,800 last week, in addition to knowing that we will need to cover \$22K in scholarship disbursements over the Summer, had Richard & me initially concerned. After further consultation and discussion with Richard & UBS Portfolio Manager Keith, however, we think that we should be still well-positioned going into and likely getting through the Summer without having to sell any UBS assets. Board of Student Assistance Chair Kitty Lenhart has provided us with her spreadsheet which details the scholarship monies to be distributed to each of

the seven scholarship students this Summer; and we anticipate further notification regarding the specific timing needs of each recipient—in order to help us manage cash our flow over the Summer. In addition to the recent \$6K balance transfer from PayPal to Wells Fargo, we also have ~\$30K in cash reserves to draw upon between UBS and Hill & Co.

June 2021 Financials / UBS

Joining us on our June 16 UBS call were trustees Jean Allen, Gary Ketchen, Fred Rutledge, myself; and Treasurer Richard Robertson. Keith gave a good, coherent market analysis, including the anticipation of a 7-15% pullback at some point during the balance of the year, but also stated he thinks we are well-positioned for now, entering the Summer...so, no recommendation for transaction at this time. Furthermore, Keith confirmed that if we do need to sell equities over the Summer, we should be able to transact and have our WF account funded within 2-3 business days. As has been our tradition for several years—to have Keith join us annually at the firehouse for a trustees' meeting, similarly an invitation was extended to Keith to join us remotely for a brief 5–10-minute presentation at Sunday's meeting. Keith was on the East Coast, however, and was not able to join the call after all, but with his apology. Additional financial and UBS account details were provided at Monday evening's members' meeting.

National Trust for Historic Preservation / Kelli Gibson

Easement Program Manager Kelli Gibson sent email on May24—to provide report in follow up to the Trust's Easement Inspection “external only” site visit, delayed from 2020 due to COVID, until earlier this year (2/10 vs 3/2/21—to be clarified). Kelli provided her nine-page report, including recommendations for our future consideration.

An Interview with Rosemary McAllister—Scottish Artist

Meandering through the village of Falkland, with beautiful cobbled streets and old buildings dating from the 1600's, I was surrounded by deep Scottish history, including the Falkland Palace which is home to the oldest tennis courts in Europe, and also a residence of Mary Queen of Scots. I met with Rosemary McAllister, a passionate Scottish landscape painter. As we chatted about her life time of painting, I found her to be a true inspiration not just to other artists, but to everyone who enjoys the Scottish countryside and landscapes.

How did you get into painting? What was one of your first inspirations?

I was born and brought up on a tea garden in Assam, India, surrounded by bright, outrageous colour combinations, so colour has always been part of my life. Ending up in London as an interior designer, and then in Scotland as an architectural designer, on retirement I returned to my first love—colour and painting.


What do you like to paint and why?

I love painting Scottish inspired landscapes and seascapes, which might include some buildings or boats. Scotland must be one of the most beautiful and atmospheric places in the world, so I'm lucky to be surrounded by hundreds of things to paint.

Is there a good time of year for you to paint, or do you paint all year round?

I paint all year round, with snow scenes being as inspiring as golden meadows of barley, and fluffy marshmallow trees, and of course the sea is challenging at all times, but great fun to paint, especially on a stormy day.

Which artists are your personal inspirations and why?




A Hidden Place, Fife - Rosemary McAllister

There are two artists who inspire me—Paul Cezanne, (1839–1906) a French post-impressionist artist, whose landscapes are solid, and the technique faultless. He often painted Mount Saint Victoire again and again, as I do East Lomond, the hill that I live at the base of.

Barbara Rae, (born 1943 in Scotland) whose landscape paintings are vibrant and quite abstract. The colours that she uses and also her style and technique are luscious, and abandoned, all of which I aspire to.

What is one of your most interesting moments in life as a painter?

Someone saw one of my paintings in an exhibition, and liked the subject, but the colour pallet didn't suit her, so she asked if I would do a similar scene, giving me the size that the painting should be, and also some of the colours that she liked—even supplying samples of the colours she wanted me to use. I was shocked as I'd never had such a request before, but decided to give it a try.

Who is your favorite Scottish painter and why?







A Scottish Blockade Runner in the American Civil War—Joannes Wyllie of the steamer Ad-Vance

The untold story of Joannes Wyllie, son of a gardener from Fife, who became one of the most successful blockade runners of the American Civil War. The book charts his life of adventure and action; he was once declared dead, survived shipwrecks, shark attack, and crewed ships on voyages across the globe.

During the war Wyllie commanded the Ad-Vance, a sleek passenger paddle steamer built in Greenock in 1862 as the Lord Clyde. The steamer was purchased by the state of North Carolina in April 1863 to run supplies through the Union naval blockade. Wyllie took the ship out of the Clyde and went on to run the Union naval blockade of Wilmington 15 times, ranking him in the top five successful commanders of a single vessel. Yet his story has been forgotten, overshadowed by the two other Americans who commanded the steamer.

After the war he returned to Scotland and took over tenancy of the farm his father rented near Kirkcaldy. His stories of adventures at



sea wowed local crowds and for over thirty years as he gave numerous popular lectures in aid of local charities. However, this fame died with him in 1902.

The book features tales of maritime adventure from voyages across the globe, first-hand accounts of Wyllie's time on the Ad-Vance, and the most comprehensive history of the Ad-Vance ever to be published. It will appeal to anyone with an interest in Scottish, Civil War, or maritime history.


